


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


The State Collected and Borrowed \$90.8 Billion




The State Spent \$94.5 Billion




The State Spent \$38.6 Billion from the Federal Government



The State has Spent \$38 Billion in Life-to-Date Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Funds




Total Spending from State Resources




Since 2009, spending from State resources increased 8.7%. Inflation-adjusted spending increased 7.1% over the same period.

Total State Spending from State Resources per Person




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Total Spending from State Resources per Person by Program for 2012-2013



Spending for Education and Public Health accounts for 63.9% of total spending from State resources.


Taxes per \$1,000 of Personal Income*



Local taxes in New York are 68.8% above the national average, while State taxes are 18.6% above the national average.


Education Funding Sources


State-Funded Debt



State-funded debt increased 62.4% since 2003. Non-voter-approved capital debt accounted for 82.2% of the State-funded debt outstanding in 2012-13.


The Cost of New York State's Debt

figures in billions




Debt service costs have increased 133.3% since 2003.

In 2012, New York's debt per capita was over three times the national median.


State Debt as a Percentage of Personal Income



New York has more than twice as much State debt as a percentage of personal income than the national median.


Unemployment Rates by Major Metropolitan Area

comparison of 2008 and 2013




Personal Income per Person, N.Y. vs. U.S.






Since 2008, personal income has grown faster in New York (8.3%) than in the nation as a whole (7.3%).

Highway Condition Ratings in New York


as a percentage of total lane miles
