





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
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STATE FUNDS 2007-2008 The State Collected and Borrowed \$80.8 Billion











Total Spending from State Resources Per Person by Program for 2007-2008





Spending for Education and Public Health account for 63% of total spending from State Resources.




Voter-approved debt has decreased from 8.4% of total State-funded debt outstanding in 2004 to 6.1% in 2008.

The Cost of New York State's Debt *figures in billions*







Debt per capita has increased nearly 15% since 2004. New York is fifth in the nation for debt per capita.



Debt issued by local governments has increased nearly \$18.9 billion (27%) between 2002 and 2006.






Taxes Per \$1,000 of Personal Income

Local taxes in New York are 77% above the national average. State taxes are slightly above the national average.


Highway Condition Rating in New York as a percent of total lane miles

1996 Clean Water/Clean Air Bond Act Disbursements




Since 1996, nearly \$1.4 billion has been disbursed through the Clean Water/Clean Air Bond Act.


